Meet Quincy Seitz.

Quincy has been my friend for over 17 years. I first met her when I taught Glass Art at the College of Marin. Quincy became successful in both glass fusing and glass beadmaking. She is also an electrician and was a foreman on big building projects in the Bay area. But most important, she is the mother of three wonderful children and seven grandchildren.

A year and a half ago, Quincy woke up and was unable to move. She managed to call her neighbor for help. Quincy was diagnosed with Guillain Barré syndrome, a rare disorder in which your body's immune system attacks your nerves.



Quincy spent months in a skilled nursing home to treat the condition and underwent intense physical therapy. When it became apparent that she would be needing full time care, InSpirit stepped up by providing additional attendant care money and encouragement that she was not alone. Her children remodeled her house to accommodate wheelchair access where she can now enjoy her garden and play with her grandchildren.

Quincy has not only been supported by us, but by a wonderful group of friends who set up a matching fund to help her buy a vehicle. With InSpirit's Special Needs fund, donations specifically designated for her, made it possible for them to donate large amounts that were tax deductible.

The road ahead is long, but she is feeling the love and support of her community as she courageously faces the reality of her condition.

The InSpirit Board of Directors is committed to continuing Aneice's vision and values, and to work to improve things wherever we can.


